History and Origin of Mother's Day

In the United States, a form of Mother's Day has been celebrated since the early 20th century. It was started as a religious observance by Ana Jarvis. She promoted the first worship service to honor mothers. The first formal Mother's Day in the U.S. was not until 1908.

From the Grand Lodge Parliamentarian

When Grand Master Tom asked me to be his Parliamentarian, I suddenly had a sinking feeling in my gut. A dozen things ran through my mind. None the least of which was "I have never had that job before" and "I'm not really sure I am qualified." Then, to make matters worse, he asked me to write an article for the newspaper about the Parliamentarian. Some days it doesn't pay to get out of bed.

It has taken a bit of research and reading but I have been able to put a few thoughts together to settle my nerves about the job and hopefully provide some useful information to the newsletter readers.

One of the first, and primary aspects of Oddfellow and Rebekah meetings is that they are governed by Roberts Rules of Order, Newly Revised. The second is that the Parliamentarian is usually "seen and not heard". The sign of a well conducted meeting is when the Parliamentarian speaks only when asked to rule on a question or action but does not have to interject himself/herself into the conversation. Other very important aspects of the job are that the parliamentarian must be completely "impartial" and know the rules. The Parliamentarian does not make motions, debate, or vote, except by ballot. The rules take precedence in governance and include the Constitution, Bylaws, and Roberts Rules of Order, Newly Revised. As a Parliamentarian, you need to sit back, observe the 'big picture", make sure all the moving parts are doing their job and doing it correctly. When, and if you see something that is not being done correctly you have the responsibility to see that what is being done incorrectly is stopped, the issue is explained, and a correction as necessary is made.

Overall, I have decided that being selected to be Grand Master Tom's Parliamentarian is a good thing for me. It appears, to me, to be an opportunity to broaden my experience as an Oddfellow and give me a chance to get a deeper understanding of the content in our governing documents and how they impact our lodges and the lodge's activities.

I am looking forward to this new task as an Oddfellow, though a bit tentatively, but, as in the past, every new task I have ever had as an Oddfellow turned out to be rewarding. Hope to see you all at the next Grand Lodge meeting in Moscow.

U.S. Armed Forces Day 3rd Saturday in May

Armed Forces Day is a joint celebration of all six branches of the U.S. military: Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marine Corps, Navy, and the newly created Space Force. The day honors all people currently serving in the U.S. armed forces. This includes the men and women who have served or are serving in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, Space Force and Coast Guard, including the National Guard and Reserve components.

Armed Forces Day is simply a day to salute sharply all of the men and women in all branches of the military, who protect you and our country. They are often upon at a moment's notice to perform a risky and perilous mission for freedom and country. They train diligently both physically and mentally. So, they are prepared to prevail in any mission they face.

History and Origin of U.S. Armed Forces Day

Just how did it all begin? Well, each branch of the military had its own day of celebration. But, on August 31, 1949, then Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson announced the creation of Armed Forces Day. President Harry Truman also announced the holiday in a presidential proclamation on February 20, 1950. All branches of the military celebrate this day and they complied on the first Armed Forces Day which was held the following year on May 20, 1950.

There are six branches of the U.S. Military

Army – Created in 1775, the Army is the oldest branch of the military.

Air Force – The National Security Act of 1947 created the Air Force.

AIR FORC

Navy – Founded on October 13, 1775, the U.S. Navy is the largest and strongest in the world.

Marine Corps – Created on November 10, 1775. The marines focus on aggressive offensive operations.

Coast Guard – Created on August 4, 1790, the Coast Guard provides maritime security.

Space Force – The newest branch of the military was officially established on December 20, 2019.
